- involving trusted family members when needed.

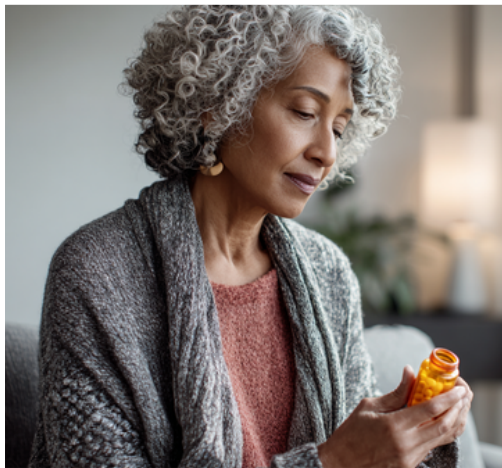
Consistency does not happen by accident.

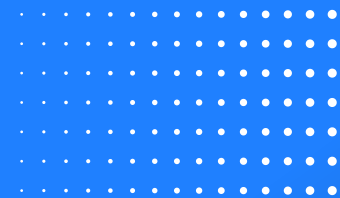

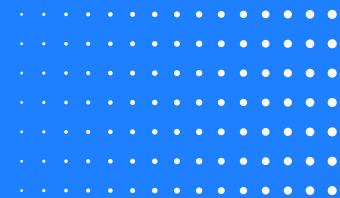
